

Children are taught French from Reception to Year 6. The focus is on word acquisition in KS1 and this is then revisited and developed in KS2 to ensure progression across year groups, building on prior knowledge. In addition to this, pupils learn about the geography, history and culture of France. Where and if appropriate, this is linked to our Sustainable Development Goals. This allows children to learn and care about the wider world around them and what they can do as global citizens.

The following skills are developed:

- Oracy listening and speaking
- Literacy reading and writing
- Knowledge about Language building on their knowledge of English/'mother tongue'
- Intercultural Understanding and Contact
- Language Learning Strategies

This is achieved by developing their ability to:

- ask and answer questions:
- use correct pronunciation and grammar;
- memorise words;
- interpret meaning;
- understand basic grammar;
- make use of bi-lingual dictionaries;
- work in pairs and groups and communicate in a foreign language

Children's spirituality and faith are promoted throughout the language curriculum as children explore things from another's perspective. This gives insight into the people, lives and traditions of other cultures, promoting tolerance to everyone. Children gain a broader perspective of the world around them and develop a respect for the culture and beliefs of others. By incorporating the sustainable development goals into their intercultural understanding, it allows us to come together as Christians and understand what we can do for the global good. One world, created by God, that we must look after together for future generations to enjoy.

We strive to make lessons as enjoyable and 'fun' as possible so that the children develop a positive attitude to the learning of Modern Foreign Languages. Therefore, we endeavour to develop children's confidence through praise for any contribution they make, however tentative. Additionally, children's physical, social and emotional health are nurtured as they develop their knowledge and understanding of the wider world around them. There is less emphasis on written skills. Reading and writing skills (Literacy) are developed in KS2, however, a multi-sensory and kinaesthetic approach to teaching is used to address varied learning styles, i.e. there is a physical element to many of the games, rhymes and songs as this serves to reinforce memory and the use of the outdoor space is integral to their learning and wellbeing.
