PSHE – Year 4 – Life on Land – Why is biodiversity important?

Prior Learning (What we already know?):

- Change and loss- moving home, losing toys, pets or friends.
- Recognise people who look after them, their family networks, who to go to if they are worried and how to attract their attention.
- That people and other living things have rights and that everyone has responsibilities to protect those rights.
- To help construct, and agree to follow, group, class and school rules and to understand how these rules help them.

Key Questions:

What does a democracy look like? Consider what our country would be like without democracy.

New Learning:

- To recognise what constitutes a positive, healthy relationship and develop the skills to maintain positive and healthy relationships.
- To recognise and care about people's feelings and try to see, respect and if necessary constrictively challenge others' points of view.
- To resolve differences by looking at alternatives, seeing and respecting others' points of view, making decisions and explaining choices.
- To consider the lives of people living in other places and people with different values and customs.

Key Facts:

Democracy means 'rule by the people'. It comes from the Greek words Dêmos, which means people, and krátos which means rule or strength. This is because the idea of democracy developed in Greece in about 507 BC.

The House of Lords has 786 members who are appointed, not elected. Members of the House of Lords scrutinise and debate bills which have passed through the House of Commons and question government parts they are concerned about.
